A Man with a Withered Hand

- Tor ver. 1-6, see Matt. 12:9-14; Luke 6:6-11 Again ch. 1:29 he entered the synagogue, and a man was there with a withered hand. 2And Luke 14:1; 20:20; [Luke 11:54; John 8:6] they watched Jesus, 3:2 Greek him to see whether he would heal him on the Sabbath, so that they might accuse him. 3And he said to the man with the withered hand, "Come here." 4And he said to them, [Luke 14:3] "Is it lawful on the Sabbath to do good or to do harm, to save life or to kill?" But they were silent. 5And he ver. 34; ch. 5:32; 10:23; [ch. 10:21] looked around at them with anger, grieved at ch. 6:52, Rom. 11:25; Eph. 4:18 their hardness of heart, and said to the man, "Stretch out your hand." [1 Kgs. 13:4] He stretched it out, and his hand was restored. 6 See Matt. 12:14 The Pharisees went out and immediately See Matt. 12:14 held counsel with ch. 12:13; Matt. 22:16; [ch. 8:15] the Herodians against him, how to destroy him.
 - Jesus The center of the story, He holds the power to heal, condemn, or to do nothing.
 - "They" the people who witnessed, the audience, probably mostly Pharisees.
 - These people were not there to even consider Jesus's actions, but only to find a mistake or fault in Him.
 - Hopefully none of us are people who are looking to tear down the faith.
 - The Man the pawn in the Pharisees' chess game, but an individual that Jesus cared for.
 - He can represent us. We have no power to "fix" or "heal" ourselves.

- We are fully relying on Jesus, and Jesus alone to make us well.
- Jesus was angry when the people watching cared more about their power and their beliefs being right, than the people who needed help.
 - We cannot allow our religion to get in the way of helping people.
- We saw last week that the Sabbath was made for man, not man for the Sabbath.
 - Jesus used TODAY to do good, and so should we.
- The Pharisees went with the Herodians, which were the Greek
 Jews who wanted the new kings to be from the line of Herod to
 rule Israel, not the line of David nor the Romans.
 - They planned to get rid of Jesus, by either destroying his reputation or killing him.

A Great Crowd Follows Jesus

Matt. 12:15 Jesus withdrew with his disciples to the sea, and Matt. 4:25; Luke 6:17 a great crowd followed, from Galilee and Judea 8and Jerusalem and Isa. 34:5; Ezek. 35:15 Idumea and from beyond the Jordan and from around See Matt. 11:21 Tyre and Sidon. When the great crowd heard all that he was doing, they came to him. 9And he told his disciples to ch. 6:32, 45 (Gk.); 8:10 (Gk.) have a boat ready for him because of the crowd, lest they ch. 5:24, 31 crush him, 10for See Matt. 4:23 he had healed many, so that all who had ch. 5:29, 34 diseases pressed around him ch. 6:56; Matt. 9:20, 21; 14:36; Luke 6:19 to touch him. 11 ch. 1:26, 34; Luke 4:41 And whenever the unclean spirits saw him, they Luke 8:28 fell down before him and cried out, "You are See Matt.

14:33 the Son of God." 12And See Matt. 12:16 he strictly ordered them not to make him known.

- Jesus never sought large crowds, the crowds sought him
 - He never sent the disciples out to find more people to follow him
 - We actually see Jesus telling people how hard it will be for them if they follow him.
- Notice the unclean spirits wanted to cry out that He was the Son of God.
 - Why did Jesus command them to be silent?
 - Because we should never trust demons, evil spirits, or satan to tell us truths about Jesus or God.
 - Jesus did not need nor want the affirmation of Satan.
 - We need to be sure to never look to or listen to them, because they can't be trusted.

The Twelve Apostles

Matt. 10:1; Luke 6:12, 13; [ch. 6:7-13; Luke 9:1, 2] And he went up on the mountain and called to him those John 13:18; 15:16, 19 whom he desired, and they came to him. 14 [See ver. 13 above] And he appointed twelve (whom he also named apostles) so that they might be with him and he might send them out to preach 15 [See ver. 13 above] and have authority to cast out demons. 16He appointed the twelve: For ver. 16-19, see Matt. 10:2-4; Luke 6:14-16; Acts 1:13 Simon (to whom Matt. 16:18; John 1:42 he gave the name Peter); 17 Matt. 4:21 James the son of Zebedee and John the brother of James (to whom he gave the name Boanerges, that is, Sons of Thunder); 18Andrew, and Philip, and Bartholomew, and Matt. 9:9 Matthew, and Thomas, and James the son of

Alphaeus, and Thaddaeus, and Simon the Zealot, 3:18 Greek *kananaios*, meaning *zealot* 19and Judas Iscariot, who betrayed him.

20Then he went ch. 7:17; 9:28 home, and the crowd gathered again, ch. 6:31 so that they could not even eat. 21 [John 7:5] And when [ver. 31] his family heard it, they went out to seize him, for they were saying, "He 2 Cor. 5:13; [John 10:20; Acts 26:24] is out of his mind."

- It would appear that Jesus had more than 12 following him, but he only chose 12 to become disciples
 - Should the others have gotten mad and left because they were passed over?
 - No, and look closely,
 - Mark is not one of the 12 listed. Most likely he learned most of Jesus's story later form Paul, Peter or Barnabas.
- He went home and crowds formed again, and they couldn't eat
 - His family were concerned that Jesus had gone crazy
 - They were trying to get him out of the spotlight
 - Rome would be watching these crowds, the Religious leaders were already plotting, and they wanted to protect him.

Blasphemy Against the Holy Spirit

22And ch. 7:1; Matt. 15:1 the scribes who came down from Jerusalem were saying, Matt. 9:34; 12:24; Luke 11:15; [Matt. 10:25]; See John 7:20 "He is possessed by Beelzebul," and "by the prince of demons he casts out the demons." 23 For ver. 23-27, see Matt. 12:25-29; Luke 11:17-22 And he called them to him and said to them in parables, "How can Satan cast out Satan? 24If a kingdom is divided against itself, that kingdom cannot stand. 25And if a house is divided against

itself, that house will not be able to stand. 26And if Satan has risen up against himself and is divided, he cannot stand, but is coming to an end.27But sa. 49:24 no one can enter a strong man's house and plunder his goods, unless he first binds the strong man. [Isa. 53:12] Then indeed he may plunder his house.

28 For ver. 28-30, see Matt. 12:31, 32; [Luke 12:10; Heb. 6:4-6; 10:26; 1 John 5:16] "Truly,

I say to you, all sins will be forgiven the children of man, and whatever blasphemies they utter, 29but whoever [Acts 7:51; Heb. 10:29] blasphemes against the Holy Spirit never has forgiveness, but is guilty of an eternal sin"— 30for they were saying, "He has an unclean spirit."

- The scribes had made quite a trip to come down and declare that Jesus was in league with Satan and using a common plan to trick people.
- Or Beelzebul was planning to overthrow Satan and take over.
- Either Way Jesus found it absurd.
 - He was here to wage war against the power of sin and darkness for the souls of men.
 - If demonic powers were warring with themselves then they would fall.
 - But, Jesus was warring against them and the scribes were actually helping Satan by attacking Jesus.
- Jesus drove out demons with the Holy Spirit, to reject the power of the Holy Spirit to cast out demons, rejects the power of the Holy Spirit to bring salvation to men's souls.
 - Jesus warned these men to be very careful not to reject the power they were dependent on in order to have salvation.

Jesus' Mother and Brothers

- 31 For ver. 31-35, see Matt. 12:46-50; Luke 8:19-21 And his mother and his ch. 6:3; Matt. 13:55; John 2:12; 7:3, 5, 10; Acts 1:14; 1 Cor. 9:5; Gal. 1:19 brothers came, and standing outside they sent to him and called him. 32And a crowd was sitting around him, and they said to him, "Your mother and your brothers 3:32 Other manuscripts add and your sisters are outside, seeking you." 33And he answered them, "Who are my mother and my brothers?" 34And ver. 5 looking about at those who sat around him, he said, "Here are my mother and my brothers! 35 [John 15:14, Heb. 2:11] For whoever Matt. 7:21, [Luke 11:28] does the will of God, he is my brother and sister and mother."
 - This is a hard truth to bear, but Jesus tried to show how our relationship is once we are saved.
 - We must accept our adoption into God's family
 - We can't be so focused on this world that we can't live in His will
 - Jesus looked around and rightly assessed that his family were those doing God's will.
 - O What about us?
 - Are we focused on God's will and His will alone?
 - Does God give us permission to neglect our families to do His will?
 - I don't think so, we are to care for widows and orphans, Jesus told the apostle John to care for his mother when he was dying, and there is quite a list beyond that.
 - We are given a way to see if we are in God's family.
 - Are you doing God's will and surrounded by people doing the same?
