MARK 7

Traditions and Commandments

1 For ver. 1-30, see Matt. 15:1-28 Now when the Pharisees gathered to him, with some of the scribes ch. 3:22 who had come from Jerusalem, 2they saw that some of his disciples ate with hands that were [Acts 10:14; Rom. 14:14] (Gk.) defiled, that is, unwashed. 3(For the Pharisees and all the Jews do not eat unless they wash their hands properly, 7:3 Greek unless they wash the hands with *a fist*, probably indicating a kind of ceremonial washing holding to Gal. 1:14; Col. 2:8 the tradition of Heb. 11:2 the elders, 4and when they come from the marketplace, they do not eat unless they wash. 7:4 Greek unless they baptize; some manuscripts unless they purify themselves And there are many other traditions that they observe, such as Heb. 9:10; [John 2:6] the washing of Matt. 23:25; Luke 11:39 cups and pots and copper vessels and dining couches. 7:4 Some manuscripts omit and dining couches) 5And the Pharisees and the scribes asked him, "Why do your disciples not walk according to [See ver. 3 above] the tradition of [See ver. 3 above] the elders, Luke 11:38 but eat with [See ver. 2 above] defiled hands?" 6And he said to them, "Well did Isaiah prophesy of you Matt. 23:13 hypocrites, as it is written,

Cited from Isa. 29:13; [Ezek. 33:31] ""This people honors me with their lips,

but their heart is far from me;

- The Pharisees were again concerned with being "clean"
 - But this clean was more about the ceremony than actually being purified.
 - They were concerned with the actions that other people could see them do and assume they were pure
- Jesus disciples did not was in the way the Jewish customs had set.

- Mark writes that there were several ceremonial washings the Pharisees focused on
- It would seem that the Pharisees were asking out of concern for the disciples and the others around them, but look closely at the question.
 - *"Why do <u>your</u> disciples???"*
 - The pharisees were in their own subtle way taking a shot at Jesus, by pointing out that His followers were not taught to follow the Hebrew Customs
 - Who did they imply dropped the ball and failed to teach them?
 - Jesus
 - And they asked why they don't "walk" in the way.
 - They missed the point of the heart being clean.
 - They were overly focused on doing the small, unimportant things right, but they neglected to take care of the big things that people wouldn't see.
- Jesus of course went right to the heart of their problem.
 - They said and did an extraordinary amount to show everybody how holy they were,
 - But, they failed to do things to prepare their hearts before they got around others
- 7 in vain do they worship me,

teaching as Col. 2:22; Titus 1:14 doctrines the commandments of men.'

8 You leave the commandment of God and hold to the tradition of men."

9And he said to them, "You have a fine way of <u>Luke 7:30; Gal. 2:21 (Gk.); Heb.</u> 10:28 (Gk.) rejecting the commandment of God in order to establish your tradition! 10For Moses said, <u>Cited from Ex. 20:12</u> 'Honor your father and your mother'; and, <u>Cited from Ex. 21:17</u> 'Whoever reviles father or mother must surely die.' 11But you say, 'If a man tells his father or his mother, "Whatever you would have gained from me is Corban"' (that is, given to God) 7:11 Or *an offering* — 12then you no longer permit him to do anything for his father or mother, 13thus <u>Gal. 3:17 (Gk.); [Rom. 2:23]</u> making void the word of God by your tradition that you have handed down. And many such things you do."

- Jesus said their worship was in vain, useless, pointless, worthless.
 - Because they traded God's law for their societies norms.
 - They were teaching commands that men made, and saying they were God's law.
 - Our traditions do not equal, much less overrule God's commands.
- The Pharisees had the problem of doing what was best for the synagogues and themselves over the commands of God
 - Instead of following the 5th commandment, they were allowing people to not take care of their parents in order to devote the money to God.
 - We saw earlier in Mark that the Sabbath was made for man, not man for the Sabbath
 - In the same line of thinking: our resources are to take care of people more than buildings
 - Our parents and family are our responsibility to take care of

- We don't allow our parents to suffer so we can give more to the church.
- Jesus said the pharisees were allowing this and many more
 - We must be sure that we don't let our worship of God lose it's power because we're neglect to serve people around us
 - Love God, Love People
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What Defiles a Person

14And he called the people to him again and said to them, Matt. 13:51 "Hear me, all of you, and understand: 15 See Acts 10:14, 15 There is nothing outside a person that by going into him can defile him, but the things that come out of a person are what defile him." 7:15 Some manuscripts add verse 16: If anyone has ears to hear, let him hear 17 And when he had entered ch. 9:28 the house and left the people, [Matt. 13:36; 15:15] his disciples asked him about the parable. 18And he said to them, "Then ch. 8:17, 18 are you also without understanding? Do you not see that whatever goes into a person from outside cannot defile him, 19 since it enters not his heart [1 Cor. 6:13] but his stomach, and is expelled?" 7:19 Greek goes out into the latrine ([Luke 11:41; Acts 10:15; 11:9] Thus he declared all foods clean.) 20And he said, Matt. 12:34; James 3:61 "What comes out of a person is what defiles him. 21For from within, out of the heart of man, come evil thoughts, sexual immorality, theft, Matt. 5:22, 28; See Ex. 20:13, 14, 17 murder, adultery, 22coveting, wickedness, deceit, 2 Cor. 12:21; Gal. 5:19; Eph. 4:19; 2 Pet. 2:7; Jude 4 Sensuality, See Matt. 6:23 (Gk.) envy, Eph. 4:31; Col. 3:8; 1 Tim. 6:4 slander, See Luke 1:51 pride, [Eph. 5:17] foolishness.23 1 Cor. 6:9, 10 All these evil things come from within, and they defile a person."

- The things we eat do not corrupt us
 - The corrupt is already there.
 - Inside of each of us in a seed that has the enormous potential to do great evil
 - The worst sins/crimes you can imagine are in us and have the ability to come out
 - Think of the worst thing you have heard of or seen and know that deep inside of you there is the capability to do just as bad.
 - Jesus and Holy Spirit help us from following through with it, but the capacity for horrible sins is in us
- Our hearts expose us for who we are when we are responding without thinking.
 - When we are reacting to events, situations, and circumstances.
 - When we act out on these impulses we are defiled
 - When we let the evil in our heart move us, we are in exposed.

The Syrophoenician Woman's Faith

24And from there he arose and went away to the region of Tyre and Sidon. 7:24 Some manuscripts omit *and Sidon* And he entered a house and did not want anyone to know, yet he could not be hidden. 25But immediately a woman whose little daughter had an unclean spirit heard of him and came and fell down at his feet. 26 [John 12:20, 21] Now the woman was a [1 Cor. 12:13] Gentile, [Acts 21:2, 3] a Syrophoenician by birth. And she begged him to cast the demon out of her daughter. 27And he said to her, "Let the children be [Acts 3:26; Rom. 1:16] fed first, for it is not right to take the children's bread and Matt. 7:6 throw it to the dogs." 28But she answered him, "Yes, Lord; yet even the dogs under the table eat the children's [Luke 16:21] crumbs." 29And he said to her, "For this statement you may John 4:50 go your way; the demon has left your daughter." 30And she went home and found the child lying in bed and the demon gone.

- This is a tough passage
- Jesus tries to hide, but the same way the sun can't be covered up by a basket, Jesus and His wonder can't be hidden
 - He didn't go to a Synagogue, but a private house
 - He tried to be hidden, he was there to give a glimpse of power among the gentiles
- This lady comes begging for her daughter
 - His response: "it is not right to take the children's bread and throw it to the dogs."
 - This seems harsh and cold hearted, even seems like it has a touch of racism attached to it
 - But, Jesus always pushed and tried the faith and humility of people, think about the rich young ruler
 - Jesus doesn't answer with easy feel good answers
 - He answered people with hard answers and those who stayed were proven true
 - Those who left did not pass the test
 - I imagine Jesus knew the struggles and strengths of this woman
 - He knew how she felt deep inside about the animosity between the Jews and Gentiles

- Perhaps she was extremely bitter about the treatment she received and hated Jews, so Jesus called her from that
- Or maybe she had such extraordinary humility that Jesus knew she could be a lesson for all who heard her to think about themselves less, and others more
- Either way she answered the question marvelously
- She acknowledged her lack of ability, how much she didn't deserve anything from Jesus,
 - But she also acknowledged how great just a tiny crumb from Jesus would be
 - She realized that He in her life in any amount was everything she needed.
- We would do well to learn from her.

Jesus Heals a Deaf Man

31 <u>For ver. 31-37</u>, [Matt. 15:29-31] Then he returned from the region of Tyre and went through Sidon to <u>Matt. 4:18</u>; John 6:1 the Sea of Galilee, in the region of the <u>ch. 5:20</u>; Matt. 4:25 Decapolis. 32And they brought to him <u>isa. 35:5</u>, 6 a man who was deaf and <u>isa. 35:5</u>, 6 had a speech impediment, and they begged him to <u>See ch. 5:23</u> lay his hand on him. 33And <u>ch. 8:23</u> taking him aside from the crowd privately, he put his fingers into his ears, and <u>ch. 8:23</u> after spitting touched his tongue. 34And <u>See ch. 6:41</u> looking up to heaven, <u>ch. 8:12</u>; John 11:33] he sighed and said to him, "Ephphatha," that is, "Be opened." 35 [See ver. 32 above] And his ears were opened, his tongue was released, and he spoke plainly. 36And <u>ch. 9:9</u>; See Matt. 8:4 Jesus 7:36 Greek *he* charged them to tell no one. But <u>ch. 1:45</u>; Matt. 9:31 the more he charged them, the more zealously they proclaimed it. 37And they were <u>ch. 10:26</u> astonished beyond measure, saying, "He has done all things well. He even makes the deaf hear and the mute speak."

- The Decapolis was the region Jesus cast out the Legion of demons and left the man there to tell his family and friends.
 - Jesus comes back and it seems that the man left there had been doing work
 - When Jesus came back, instead of being afraid and asking him to leave they were bringing people to him
- This poor man was in bad shape
 - Not only could he not speak, but he couldn't talk
 - He had no way to explain himself, he had no way to tell what was on his mind
 - He was in a sense trapped inside his body.
- Thank you, Jesus for allowing us to hear and speak your word
 - Let us never take it for granted, and please don't allow us to stop from speaking your truth.
- Jesus used an unusual method on this healing
 - But it wasn't some magical combination of things
 - o It was a visual expression of what was happening
 - Usually Jesus said to be healed, but this patient couldn't hear a prayer or praise to God
 - Jesus did what this man could see, with his hands, fingers, spit, he sighed, and spoke one word, and I'm guessing the man's first word was "opened"
- Nobody could speak badly of a man who healed deaf and mute people

- There was nothing to gain, this healed man would be rich
- But it would only silence people more and more who tried to find fault with Jesus
- The proof of Jesus's heart condition was the actions pouring out of him into the lives of everyone around him.
 - Your actions prove the condition of your heart as well,
 - Consider them,
 - What's the condition of your heart?
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
